During 2016-17 SAASVHAC has continued to actively consult with their members (1577 volunteers) and work closely with SAAS to ensure that the needs and priorities of the SAAS volunteer sector are considered in the provision of ambulance services to country South Australia.

During 2016-17 SAASVHAC have had involvement in, and have provided advice on a range of SAAS initiatives to enhance the sustainability of the volunteer sector within South Australia. SAASVHAC have provided advice to SAAS on a number of volunteer focused projects including:

- Improving communication with volunteers
- Improving technology at volunteer stations
- Implementing job descriptions for volunteer leadership positions and associated guiding principles for leaders to adhere to
- Improving volunteer recruitment and selection processes.

SAASVHAC has also contributed to a SAAS review of volunteer education systems including establishing new volunteer roles, service delivery mechanisms and training systems.

Volunteer reward and recognition is an issue that SAASVHAC have continued to advocate for during 2016-17. This has resulted in SAAS implementing volunteer service award badges and systems to recognise and acknowledge the contribution of volunteers to both SAAS and their communities.

In addition to improve SAASVHAC's role in consulting and advocating on behalf of the volunteer sector a Volunteer Youth Advisory Committee was established to enable volunteers aged up to 35 years to have a direct link into their SAASVHAC representative and promote their interests and concerns to both SAAS and SAASVHAC.

SAASVHAC also advocated to ensure that recent changes to Ambulance Cover conditions did not unduly disadvantage SAAS volunteers.
